By the time this first newsletter of the new year reaches residents' mailboxes, most of us will have already abandoned our new year's resolutions. Congratulations to those readers who have held steadfast to their new goals. The Board of Supervisors does not make new year's resolutions, but we do set goals and determine the hierarchy or priority among such goals. One of those goals is to roll out the new website in the

first half of this year. There will be one site for both the Township and the Community Center. We hope that you will find the new, single site to be intuitive and more responsive to searches from handheld devices than is the current website. It will feature a more expansive calendar to announce all the activities happening in our Township in one spot.

It is anticipated that the calendar will be jam packed as there are always a lot of great things happening at the Community Center. And the Community Center represents one of the 2025 priorities as well as one of its fiscal challenges. The Community Center has been in need of a new roof and HVAC system for some time now. Pharo, Monocacy Parks Receiving New Playgrounds as Pump Track Goes to Bid

walking paths. This year, we have quite a few improvements to look forward to as the Township

continues its focus on upgrading its parks and trails. Among the updates we'll see in 2025 are Pharo and Monocacy Parks both receiving new playgrounds, and a pump track being installed just behind the Community Center at the Hanover Township Municipal Park.

Those who have braved the cold to walk their dogs or go for a brisk run near the end of Gaspar Ave. in Stafore Estates have already witnessed evidence





Sinkhole Awareness

Recent sinkholes in the Lehigh Valley, including a large one in Hanover Township, have brought attention to a problem that has been around for an exceedingly long time. Most of our area of Pennsylvania is underlaid with limestone. Sinkholes can develop gradually or abruptly, and their occurrence is not limited to Pennsylvania. In 2002, I wrote an overview of sinkholes, emphasizing the importance of recognizing early signs when possible, taking immediate action and advising on the importance of having insurance coverage for sinkhole damage. The following is an update of that article.

Have you ever had that sinking feeling, but you are not on a river, lake, or ocean? You may be experiencing a sinkhole. A sinkhole collapse is the sudden settlement or collapse of earth resulting from subterranean voids created by the action of water on limestone or similar rock formations. Sinkhole development varies in different areas of the country, depending on geologic conditions. Quite often, surface water makes its way through openings in rocks and soil and begins to dissolve the underlying limestone. Surface disturbances may compound or accelerate the problem. Poor or improper drainage often concentrates the water in the wrong place. Water pipe leaks or underground streams can be the main cause of the problem.



Sinkholes sometimes cause extensive damage to structures and roads, resulting in costly and often uninsured repairs. The worst area for sinkhole damage is Florida. It seems as if every year there is a car or two and even a whole house disappearing into a Florida sinkhole. A major local sinkhole event involved the collapse and leveling of a modern office building in downtown Allentown. Sinkholes can also be deadly. In 1993, a sinkhole measuring 100 feet wide and 25 feet deep appeared under an Atlanta parking lot. Two individuals lost their lives, and many vehicles were damaged in the collapse. Limestone deposits underlie much of the Lehigh Valley. We may not be a hotbed for sinkhole activity like Florida and Kentucky, but many of us have seen the effects of sinkholes all around us. It is important that you recognize the early signs of a sinkhole and what to do when they become apparent.

Pre-collapse Sinkhole Indicators:

- Water runoff is ponding where it had not previously.
- Cracks begin to appear on the ground surface.
- Posts, fences, or trees begin to tilt.
- Small preliminary holes begin to appear on the ground or macadam.
- Vegetation is wilting in a localized area, while the surrounding area is fine.
- Nearby well water (not prevalent in Hanover) begins to experience turbidity (i.e., cloudy, sediment filled).
- A water pipe break is often evidenced by dirty water coming from faucets. Report that to the water company immediately.
- Understand that sinkholes can appear without warning.

What to do if a sinkhole opens on or near your property:

- If a sinkhole threatens your home, contact your homeowner's insurance company for assistance. Take steps to limit further damage and to correct the situation. Seek professional help. Keep others, especially children, well clear of the hole. The subsurface void can be far larger than the surface hole. The ground surrounding the hole can be very dangerously unstable.
- If there is evidence of running water, immediately call the water company servicing your area,
- If a public road is threatened, contact the Hanover Township office immediately. After hours, contact the Colonial Regional Police Department.
- If the road surface has already collapsed, also immediately contact the Colonial Regional Police Department.

DO NOT IGNORE A SINKHOLE, no matter how small or insignificant it seems. The problem can quickly worsen. Even the pre-collapse indicators should be investigated for cause and a possible developing sinkhole.

A word about insurance coverage for sinkhole damage:

 Damage caused by sinkholes is typically not covered by standard homeowner's insurance. Sinkhole damage coverage can usually be added to your policy for a moderate cost. This covers the physical damage to dwellings and personal property caused directly by sinkhole collapse. Contact your insurance company or agent to determine if your policy includes sinkhole coverage and consider obtaining it if you don't have it.



2026 Trash Collection - What a New Contract Likely Means for the Township

The Township's existing trash and recycling contract with Republic Services will expire at the end of 2025. In preparation for the new contract to begin in 2026, the Township will put trash and recycling services out to bid this year. Residents should be aware that cost increases in trash collection are becoming a growing trend across the region.

Across the Lehigh Valley and the state, neighboring communities are seeing sharp price hikes in their waste management services. Here are a few examples of recent increases that could set the stage for similar changes in our Township:

- Allentown As reported by *Morning Call* on October 3, 2024, trash fees are set to increase by 46%
- Lower Macungie Lehigh Valley Live reported on July 21, 2024, that the township approved a new waste management contract with an increase of more than 50%
- South Whitehall In September 2023, *Lehigh Valley News* covered a 62% price hike for waste collection approved for the following year.
- Upper Mount Bethel Township In 2023, residents faced a nearly 116% increase in trash and recycling collection fees, jumping from \$225 per household in 2022 to \$485.
- Lower Paxton Township Nearby communities, such as Middle Paxton and Derry Township, have seen dramatic increases in their rates. Middle Paxton's collection nearly doubled in 2022, reaching \$600 per year, while Derry Township's rate went up by 89.7%, reaching \$113.85 per quarter.

While it is impossible to predict the exact cost increases for our Township in 2026, it is clear that the landscape of waste collection services is shifting in the direction of higher costs. Residents will experience higher rates in 2026. The Township will continue explore all avenues to mitigate such increase and to update you on the process. The final results of the bid, once a contract is finalized, will be made available at Board meetings and in this newsletter.

by our representatives in Harrisburg. The most important feature of a formal the field house will be permanent bathroom facilities. Such a facility will help attract tournaments to our Township.

We will need to sharpen our pencils in 2025, not only to complete upgrades at the Community Center but also to address the anticipated increases the Township faces with the expiration of its current residential waste and recycling contract. Most, if not all, of the neighboring Townships in the Valley that have gone to bid have seen much higher annual costs. It is, therefore, timely that the Township has hired a new auditor, Herbein CPA's & Advisors, to conduct the annual review of our financial status and accounting practices. The change was not made out of concern for the fiscal health of the Township but rather to take advantage of the resources of a larger accounting firm. The hiring of a new audit team coincides with the implementation of new financial software this year as well. Having a new audit team look at our practices with fresh eyes will hopefully yield greater efficiencies. That review, combined with the new software, the Board hopes will assist the Township's staff to further develop our budget and budget process from not only a general road map but also into a tool to identify fiscal trends, both positive and negative.

The Township's public works team anticipates receipt of two long awaited utility dump trucks in Spring. The department has already taken delivery of a new street sweeper. The team will continue to maintain our parks and upgrade them, as with the installation of new playground equipment at Pharo Park. The Township will be investigating the upgrade of certain pedestrian cross walk locations within the Township and is exploring the costs associated with automated pedestrian detection systems.

Achieving these goals in 2025, the Board hopes, will keep Hanover the great place it is to live, work and play. \blacksquare

of the work beginning at Pharo Park. In mid-January, the old, outdated playground equipment, which was designed for children ages 2–5, was removed. The swings were also removed but are just part of general maintenance. A new, larger playground designed for ages 5–12 will soon arrive. It will still feature several slides but include various climbing stations as well. Installation is scheduled to begin as the weather allows.

It's just the first phase of updates for Pharo Park. Not this year, but in the near future, there are plans to resurface both the basketball and tennis courts. The tennis courts will also be outfitted to accommodate pickleball enthusiasts.

In addition to Pharo, Monocacy Park, on Hanoverville Road, will receive a youth fitness park to go along with the playground that currently sits on the 8.5-acre site. The fitness park will include an overhead ladder, overhead rungs, parallel bars and floating stepping pods. The equipment will be purchased with funds the Township received from the Northampton County Department of Community and Economic Development's 2024 Grow NORCO grant. At the May 14 Board of Supervisors meeting, the Supervisors unanimously approved a resolution to apply for the grant



and on Dec. 18, we were awarded \$22,500.

As for the pump track at the Municipal Park, it will be put out for bid in February/March with construction beginning later in the year.

These are just a few of the projects in the works to improve on the wonderful park system we have in the Township and we'll be sure to share more updates as we move forward with additional projects.



February: Heart Disease Awareness Month and Women's Health - A Focus on Heart Disease By Jean Versteeg, Vice Chair, Board of Supervisors

A woman I am friends with recently had a serious, unexpected heart incident. Her experience reminded me that cardiac conditions may present very differently in women, and it is important to educate our-

selves for our benefit and the benefit of the women we care about.

Every February, the American Heart Association shines a light on this crucial health issue affecting millions worldwide: heart disease. While heart disease is often seen as a condition that primarily affects men, it is also a leading cause of death among women. February is American Heart Month, and Friday, February 7th is National Wear Red Day. This is a great time to learn how to recognize the unique ways that heart disease impacts women.

The Hidden Threat: Heart Disease and Women

Heart disease remains the number one cause of death for women in the United States, yet many women don't recognize the risks or symptoms associated with the condition. According to the American Heart Association, one in three women dies from heart disease, more than all forms of cancer combined.

What's particularly troubling is that women often experience different symptoms from men. While men typically experience chest pain or discomfort as the hallmark sign of a heart attack, women may have more subtle or less recognizable symptoms such as:

- · Shortness of breath
- · Unusual fatigue
- · Nausea or lightheadedness
- · Pain in the back, jaw, or neck

Because these symptoms can be mistaken for other conditions, women may not seek immediate medical attention, which can delay diagnosis and treatment.

Why Heart Disease Affects Women Differently

Several factors contribute to why heart disease can present differently in women. A key one is the role of hormones. Estrogen provides some protection against heart disease in younger women, but this protection diminishes after menopause, making post-menopausal women more vulnerable to cardiovascular conditions. Additionally, women with high blood pressure, diabetes, or a history of preeclampsia (a pregnancy-related complication) are at higher risk.

Women are also more likely to suffer from microvascular disease, a condition where the small blood vessels in the heart become damaged, leading to heart problems. This condition is more challenging to diagnose with traditional tests like an angiogram and can be more difficult to treat.

The Importance of Preventive Care

It's essential for women to take proactive steps to safeguard their heart health. The American Heart Association recommends that women:

- ► Know their numbers: Monitor blood pressure, cholesterol levels, and blood sugar. Regularly discussing these metrics with a healthcare provider can help identify potential risk factors early.
- ► Exercise regularly: At least 150 minutes of moderate-intensity aerobic activity per week can significantly reduce the risk of heart disease.
- Maintain a healthy diet: Focus on a diet rich in fruits, vegetables, whole grains, and healthy fats while limiting processed foods and added sugars.
- ► Manage stress: Chronic stress can contribute to heart disease, so practicing relaxation techniques such as yoga, deep breathing, or meditation can be beneficial.
- Avoid smoking: Smoking increases the risk of heart disease and stroke, particularly for women who take birth control pills or are pregnant.

Raising Awareness: What You Can Do

February is an opportunity to raise awareness about heart disease, particularly as it impacts women. Here are some ways you can get involved:

▶ Wear Red: On National Wear Red Day (the first Friday of

- February), show your support for women's heart health by wearing red and encouraging others to do the same. This simple gesture helps raise awareness about the importance of heart disease prevention in women.
- ▶ Share Knowledge: Educate your friends, family, and community about the risks of heart disease, the symptoms to watch for, and the importance of early detection. Many people may not realize the risks or know how to take action to protect their heart health.

CRPD Invites You to Join Project Lifesaver

Do you have a family member, a friend or an acquaintance with wandering disorders? More specifically, at risk individuals are those with Alzheimer's, Dementia, Autism, Down syndrome, and traumatic brain injuries.

Do you know that there is a program to assist local law enforcement agencies in locating people who wander off?


Project Lifesaver International has the premier search and rescue program operated internationally by public safety agencies and is strategically designed for "at risk" individuals who are prone to the life-threatening behavior of wandering. The program is designed for all ages. The primary mission of Project Lifesaver is to provide timely response to save lives and reduce potential injury for adults and children with the propensity to wander due to a cognitive condition. The goal is to enable first responders to achieve the goal of "bringing loved ones home."

I'm very pleased to advise that our Colonial Regional Police Department (CRPD) is a Project Lifesaver participating agency. The Project Lifesaver program (PLS) was created so that law enforcement/search teams could streamline search and rescue operations. It significantly decreases search time and increases the chance of successful reunions.

When a person signs up for PLS they receive a bracelet with a tracking device "transmitter" secured in it. That "transmitter" has a frequency number specifically assigned to that person. If the individual were to wander, CRPD (and neighboring law enforcement agencies) has a receiver that can track the individual's transmitter.

CRPD's receiver can reach a transmitter signal within a mile radius of where the receiver is located. The receiver is portable and can be used from patrol vehicles or on foot. Other area agencies would assist as needed.

PLS is the only organization that is officially organized to train Public Safety Agencies such as CRPD to electronically locate lost people with transmitters. Officer Aspen Miller is the CRPD's training coordinator for program.



Why Enroll Your Loved One into Project Lifesaver?

Wandering is a very common behavior among those with cognitive conditions, and in that instance, it is very dangerous, and potentially life threatening. By enrolling your loved one in Project Lifesaver, they will become a part of a community that is dedicated to their safety and well-being, while ensuring that in the event that they wander, they will be located within a timely manner and returned home safely. Project Lifesaver will provide your loved one with an additional layer of protection, which will provide your family with newly found peace of mind.

How to Enroll

Yard waste and leaf collection totals are in!

2024 has produced one of the highest yard waste and leaf collection totals the Township has ever seen. This year the yard waste truck dumped 142 loads totaling 852 yards equaling over 700 tons of yard waste. As we wrapped up one of the dustiest leaf seasons on record, we saw some high totals as well. The four leaf collection trucks visited the city compost center 187 times totaling 5,610 yards of leaves. If leaves are still placed curbside, please bag them and put them out for the yard waste collection coming up in April.

Emergency Preparedness

Tips to prepare for an emergency:

- Have a clear walking path to your home and through your home so we can quickly and safely get to you or the patient. If possible, have someone meet us outside or at the door so we can easily locate you.
- ► If you have pets, please lock them up for our safety. Pets are very protective of their owners especially when their human is not feeling well.
- Make a list of all your medication, allergies and past medical history and keep it current. You should always keep a list with you in your wallet in case you are away from home. We need this information to properly treat you at the time of an emergency. Some medications you take may interfere with the treatment you need at the time of the emergency.
- ► A valid advanced directive such as a DNR, POLST or medical power of attorney form, either the signed original or a copy MUST be given to EMS so they can honor it.

- ▶ Maintain an updated list of emergency contacts, including family members, close friends, and your primary care physician's contact information.
- ► Ensure your home and both sides of your mailbox are marked clearly with your house number so first responders can quickly identify your location.

Urgent Care or Emergency Room

Know when to call 911 or go to an urgent care center. Urgent care facilities are for non-life-threatening medical issues and emergency rooms are for potentially life-threatening conditions in which delaying care could cause permanent harm or death.

Some examples to go to urgent care centers:

- Colds/Flu Sore throat Earaches
- Urinary infections Bronchitis, pneumonia
- Eye infections Other common injuries & illnesses

Some examples to go to emergency room are:

- Chest pain/heart attack symptoms
- Heart palpitations
- Severe breathing problems/shortness of breath
- Allergic reactions to foods, animals or bug bites
- Unconsciousness Drug overdose Loss of vision
- Head or eye injuries Pneumonia Seizures
- Shock Weakness or pain in an arm or leg
- Deep or large wounds that do not stop bleeding
- Constant vomiting
