Hanover Township Celebrates the Retirement of Longtime Supervisor John N. Diacogiannis

As 2025 draws to a close, Hanover Township bids a fond farewell to one of its most dedicated public servants, John N. Diacogiannis, who will retire from the Board of Supervisors after an extraordinary 41 years of service. John's journey with the Township has been marked by unwavering commitment, strategic leadership, and a deep-rooted passion for community improvement. His retirement marks the end of an era, but his legacy will continue to shape Hanover for generations to come.

Born in Bethlehem in 1949, John grew up in the Lehigh Valley, graduating from Liberty High School in 1967. He pursued higher education with vigor, earning a Bachelor of Arts in Economics from Moravian College in 1971 and an MBA in Finance from Lehigh University in 1972. These academic foundations laid the groundwork for a successful career in finance and risk management.

Professionally, John began as a staff accountant and cash management specialist at Penn Dixie Industries in 1972. In 1975, he joined PPL Corporation, where he rose to the role of Risk and Corporate Insurance Manager. His expertise in insurance and risk extended beyond his day job, influencing his volunteer work and earning him prestigious designations such as Chartered Property Casualty Underwriter (CPCU). John was actively involved in organizations like the Risk & Insurance Management Society, the Insurance Society of Philadelphia, the International Risk Management Institute, the Energy & Utilities Network, and Nuclear Energy Insurance Limited (NEIL), where he served as Chairman of the Insurance Advisory Committee.

John's personal life has been equally rich. In 1973, he moved to Hanover Township's Mark Twain Circle, putting down roots in the community he would later serve so faithfully. He married Elene Pitsilos Diacogiannis in 1974, and together they raised three sons: Telly, Niko, and Evan. The family relocated to Bonnie Avenue in 1982, further embedding themselves in Township life.

John's government involvement began in January 1979 when he joined the Hanover Planning Commission, serving until December 1984. In January 1985, he was elected to the Hanover Board of Supervisors, a position he has held ever since – culminating in over four decades of leadership. During his tenure, he served as Vice Chairman from January 2003 to December 2005 and as Chairman from January 2006 to December 2021, and again from January 2023 to December 2023. His steady hand guided the Township through growth, challenges, and opportunities.

Beyond Hanover, John's influence extended regionally. From January 2001 to December 2019, he contributed to the Lehigh Valley Planning Commission, including as Vice Chairman. Since January 2008, he has been a key member of the Colonial Regional Police Commission, serving as both Chairman and Secretary/Treasurer. John also represented Hanover as a delegate to the Pennsylvania State Association of Township Supervisors (PSATS) and as a representative to the Northampton County Council of Governments and the Nazareth

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Hanover Township Pump Track - Now Open!

The new Hanover Township Pump Track is set to be a fantastic attraction for our residents and the surrounding community. The track was originally designed by Dave King of Dirt Sculpt, a nationally recognized trail builder. His design was then transformed into engineered plans by Hanover Engineering, our Township Engineer. Following Township bidding requirements, the project was put out for public bid, and Dirt Sculpt was awarded the contract as the lowest bidder.

Since mid-July, Dave and his talented crew have been hard at work, bringing this vision to life right here in Hanover Township. King is one of the premier bike pump track and trail builders in the United States and serves as the in-house trail builder for Camp Woodward in Woodward, PA. Joining him on this project are some of the most respected names in the BMX and trail-building world:

- ▶ Will Blount from High West Dirt a professional track and trail builder from Texas and former sponsored rider.
- ► Corey Martinez professional BMX rider, winner of the X-Games Real BMX 2018, and sponsored athlete.
- ► Lukas Halahan and his brothers Nathan and Shane Halahan – award-winning BMX riders from Pittsburgh, known for their incredible skills and popular videos showcasing their home track.
- ► Craig Kleckner a local talent who brings additional expertise and energy to this amazing crew.

Together, this group built a pump track that will bring fun, fitness, and excitement to riders of all ages and skill levels.

How to Use a Pump Track

A pump track is a continuous loop of rollers (small hills) and banked turns designed for bikes, skateboards, scooters, and even skates. Instead of pedaling, riders use an up-and-down "pumping" motion with their arms and legs to maintain speed around the track. This makes it a fun and challenging workout that builds bike-handling skills, balance, and coordination.

Here are a few tips to get started:

- ► **Start Slow:** Beginners can roll over the bumps and gently coast through the turns. With practice, you'll learn to "pump" and generate speed without pedaling.
- ► Look Ahead: Always keep your eyes focused a few feet in front of you to anticipate the next roller or turn.
- ► Stay Balanced: Keep your pedals level and knees slightly bent to absorb the track's rhythm.
- ▶ Multiple Lines: Many pump tracks, including Hanover's, are designed with multiple routes. This allows riders of different skill levels to enjoy the track at the same time and gives advanced riders the chance to explore more challenging lines.
- ▶ Share the Track: Be courteous take turns, wait for others to clear the line before starting, and encourage fellow riders.

The Hanover Township Pump Track will be a place where kids, families, and seasoned riders alike can enjoy the outdoors, stay active, and challenge themselves. We can't wait to see the community come together and experience this exciting new addition!

In May 2025, John was presented with the St. Photios Award at the annual banquet hosted by the Greek Orthodox Metropolis of Pittsburgh, recognizing his lifetime of dedication and service to the Church and community.

As John steps into retirement, the Township reflects on his profound impact. From planning sustainable development to ensuring public safety through his Police Commission work,

"John's dedication has been instrumental in making Hanover a thriving, family-friendly community," said a fellow Supervisor. "His expertise in finance and risk management brought a level of professionalism that elevated our deci-

2026 Budget Priorities

Being capable fiscal stewards of taxpayer funds is perhaps the highest priority of the members of the Board of Supervisors. Where taxpayers empower us to spend those funds is an

expression of community values.

Our community values its parks and recreational facilities. A number of recreation upgrades will be funded in 2026. Bids have been invited for the construction of a fieldhouse with permanent bathroom facilities and concession amenities. A formal request for proposal has also been issued seeking interested and qualified consultants to undertake a comprehensive review of Township parks and recreation facilities in order to prepare a long-term management plan to complete upgrades and improvements. While the Township will fund both the construction of the fieldhouse and the facilities study largely from grants previously awarded, the 2026 budget will include the necessary matching funds to complete these projects.

We have not been successful, thus far, in obtaining any grants to use towards the replacement of the Community Center roof and its HVAC system. Rather than delay this project further, replacement will proceed in 2026, but in stages. Township staff are meeting with contractors to determine the best and most logical path forward.

In terms of other infrastructure, the Board will commit funds to complete the required engineering and traffic studies to improve a number of crosswalks in the Township. While

it is not anticipated to approach the scale of the stormwater project completed along Harmor Lane, Lord Byron Drive, and Chaucer Lane, engineering plans have been completed to address stormwater issues along Gaspar Avenue. The Board hopes to obtain favorable bids to complete this work in 2026.

Our Public Works team receives high marks perennially for their maintenance of our roads, parks, and buildings. Delivering that level of service takes not only a great team, but also the right tools and equipment. We anticipate replacement of a pickup truck in 2026 with a utility truck which will allow the staff to have a truck ready with tools at all times.

Despite the campaign to increase voluntary fundraising for our Volunteer Fire and EMS department, the department has actually seen material reduction in donations in each of the last three years. That shortfall will have to be addressed from the Township budget to help our volunteers maintain the level of service we have come to expect. The Board will likely set aside some funds to potentially fund a study to develop a thoughtful, long-term plan to address an increasing shortage of volunteers, dwindling voluntary, financial support for the department, and skyrocketing equipment and vehicle costs.

The budget for 2026 will likely be in the 10.5 million dollar range. Please feel free to email any one of us with any concerns or questions regarding the budget or come to an upcoming meeting where the 2026 budget is listed for discussion.



Municipal Park Additions Ready for Fall By Stephen M. Gross, Board of Supervisors

Earlier this month, the Township held a grand opening for the pump track, which is located at Municipal Park just between the pickleball courts and the overflow parking lot. has another recreational option for residents of all ages. Yes, all ages. Those who are unfamiliar with pump tracks might be surprised, but I saw several of the Township's older residents getting excited about using the pump track on social media over the summer.

And as I mentioned before in this newsletter, it all started with a letter from a young resident (who is not so young anymore), Braxton Seacor, who wrote to the Board multiple times asking for a skate park. So, if you have a great idea for the Township, let us know. Maybe yours can become a reality Please turn to page 4.

Just a few hundred feet from the Pump Track, another addition to Municipal Park can be found – a paved path that completes a "loop" of the walking path that winds throughout the complex.

When I first ran for this office, residents offered numerous suggestions, and one of the few I heard repeatedly was that it would be nice to have the Municipal Park walking path turned into a loop. Meeting with Township Manager Mark Hudson last year about a few different topics, I mentioned getting this done. We talked about logistics and at the end of August 2025, our Public Works team installed and paved a short stretch in the north end of the park connecting the existing paths. This addition, one end of which starts at the top of the overflow parking lot, allows those using the path to loop back down to the center of the complex without leaving the park. Prior to the path being installed, to loop back around you would have to leave the park and use a combination of Greenfield Rd. and Clair St. to reach a returning path.

This isn't the first path work done recently by the Public Works team either. They've had their practice installing and paving a trail earlier in August at Monocacy Park. Without



them, neither of these projects would have been possible, so a huge thanks goes out to the Public Works crew.

All this work comes prior to constructing the Township's 10-year Parks and Recreation Plan, which is beginning to move forward as 2025 comes to a close. Stay tuned for more updates on the plan and an opportunity to provide your input.

Important Update: Trash and Recycling Collection Contract

Hanover Township's current contract for trash and recycling collection with Republic Services will come to an end at the close of this year. Earlier in 2025, the Township placed trash and recycling collection services out for public bid and received proposals from several companies. After careful review, Whitetail Disposal was selected as the lowest responsible bidder, and the Board of Supervisors awarded them a new five-year contract.

We recognize that the cost of trash collection has risen sharply across the Lehigh Valley and throughout Pennsylvania. Some municipalities have seen rate increases of 80% to 100%. By carefully structuring our bid and speaking directly with multiple providers, Hanover Township was able to secure pricing that is significantly lower than expected – resulting in only about an average 20% increase for our residents.

What Will Change in 2026?

- ▶ New Totters Provided: Each household will receive one 95-gallon trash totter and one 95-gallon recycling totter. Beginning in 2026, all trash and recycling must be placed inside these totters for collection.
- ► Manual Truck Collection Ending in 2026: Starting in 2026, collection trucks will no longer have workers riding

- on the back. Totters will be emptied mechanically into the trucks. *Please note: Any yard waste containers currently being used for trash will no longer be collected after 2025.*
- ▶ Bulk Item Collection: Residents must schedule bulk pickups directly through a special Hanover Township/ Whitetail website. Additional fees may apply for bulk items.
- ► Condominium Communities: Whitetail will install new dumpsters in the same locations as the current ones.

Next Steps

Whitetail Disposal will begin distributing new totters in mid-December 2025. Information on services will be available via mailers and on a new website effective December 1 (see below), ensuring that residents are prepared for the start of the new contract in January 2026. The Township will provide more details, including the scheduling process for bulk pickup and reminders about the new collection procedures closer to the transition. We appreciate your cooperation and patience as we move into this new contract, and we are confident that these changes will provide efficient, reliable, and cost-effective service to our community.

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Street Trees in the Township

Shade Tree Advisory Board

Many residents have expressed concern about the lack of street trees in some residential areas of the Township, and they ask why the Township doesn't take care of this. There actually is a planned timetable for the many different subdivisions to be inspected, and the Shade Tree Advisory Board does assist with this important work. We have been working through the many developments in a systematic way for the past two years, and this detailed work has resulted in dozens of trees being planted. So, the effort is paying off, but it is a very slow process, especially if the property owners do not plant a missing tree when they have received notices.

It is the homeowner's responsibility to maintain and/ or replace any street tree that is missing, in accordance with Township Ordinance 168. If the missing tree has not been replaced, a reminder letter is sent out, and a follow-up inspection shows that either it was or was not planted. Planting your missing street tree helps enhance the tree canopy in Hanover Township. This not only makes our Township a more desirable place to live and work, but also helps improve the air quality and gives beneficial shade on those hot summer days.

Street trees can only be removed after the homeowner applies for and receives a permit from the Zoning Officer. If you realize you have a missing or dead street tree on your property, you can apply for the appropriate permit and plant the replacement tree. You are responsible for pruning all trees that have low-hanging branches that interfere with a sidewalk or are a hazard to the street.

The members of the volunteer Shade Tree Advisory Board can assist the Zoning Officer by checking for missing or dead street trees and making a report that is then verified by the Zoning Officer. Letters are sent out to remind property owners that they do need to replace missing street trees. Board members can also assist by checking to see if the missing trees have been planted. If you have any questions, you can contact the Zoning Officer or attend the monthly Shade Tree Advisory Board meetings, as posted on the Township website (hanovertwp-nc.org).

Please know that we are committed to maintaining the beautiful and environmentally positive benefits of having the correct number of street trees at every address in the Township. \blacksquare

Time to Rake & Relax: Place Your Leaves Curbside, and We'll Handle the Rest!

Leaf collection is set to begin on October 13. The Township will collect leaves weekly across three zones: North, Middle, and South. As the season progresses, there may be a delay in your weekly pickup, but rest assured, we will come by to collect your leaves.

Residents are asked to place their leaves curbside in windrows to make collection easier. Please also be mindful of where you park; trucks and equipment need space to operate safely. For the latest updates on the progress of each collection truck, please visit the Township website.

How to Create a Windrow

Think of a windrow as a "leaf highway" for the collection trucks. Rake your leaves into a long, narrow row along the curb, making sure to keep them away from parked cars, mailboxes, and storm drains. Remove sticks, rocks, and other debris so the trucks can pick up your leaves quickly and safely. •



Fall Fire Safety: Staying Safe as the Seasons Change

As the crisp air settles in and the leaves begin to turn, it's time to cozy up with blankets, warm drinks, and...fire safety reminders! Autumn is a beautiful season, but it also brings increased fire risks. From heating equipment to holiday cooking, here's what you need to know to protect your family and home this fall.



Top Fall Fire Risks

1. Home Heating Hazards

As temperatures drop, heaters come back into use.

- Keep anything that can burn (furniture, curtains, blankets) at least three feet away from space heaters.
- ► Have your furnace inspected by a professional each year.
- ► Never use an oven to heat your home.
- 2. Fireplace & Wood Stove Safety

Before lighting the first fire:

- Get your chimney cleaned and inspected.
- Use a sturdy screen to stop sparks from flying.
- Never leave a fire unattended.
- 3. Candles & Decorations

Candles add warmth but can also ignite fires.

- Keep candles at least 12 inches from anything flammable.
- ▶ Use flameless candles when possible.
- ▶ Never leave a candle burning in an empty room.
- 4. Fall Yard Cleanup

Dry leaves and branches can be fire hazards.

- ► Rake and remove leaves from around your home and gutters.
- ▶ Store firewood at least 30 feet away from your house.
- Never burn leaves

Cooking Safety for the Season

With holidays and fall feasts approaching, kitchen safety is critical.

- ► Stay in the kitchen while cooking, especially when using the stovetop.
- ► Keep children and pets at least three feet away from the cooking area.
- ► If a grease fire starts, never use water. Cover the pan with a lid and turn off the heat.

Is Your Home Fire-Ready?

- ✓ Check your smoke alarms.
- ► Test alarms monthly.
- ► Replace batteries if needed.
- ► Replace alarms every 10 years.

✓ Plan and practice an escape route.

- Every family member should know two ways out of each room.
- Designate a safe meeting place outside.
- Practice your escape plan twice a year fall is a great time to do it!

Let's keep this fall safe, cozy, and fire-free.



Township regulations require that a path be cleared within 36 hours after the end of any snowfall or ice event. Within 48 hours, the full width and length of the sidewalk must be completely cleared. Snow may not be placed in the street, and if you have a fire hydrant on or near your property, please take a few extra minutes



Please remember that sidewalks located behind your home, even if separated by trees or landscaping, are still your responsibility to maintain. A clear sidewalk not only keeps you in compliance with Township rules but also helps keep your neighbors safe.

If you are unsure whether a sidewalk near your property is your responsibility, the Hanover Township Zoning Office is happy to answer your questions. Working together, we can all help make Hanover Township safe and welcoming through the winter season.

Exclusive: HTCC to Host Q&A with NBA Hall of Fame Writer

To say there is an abundance of successful professionals

here in Hanover Township would be an understatement. Over the past couple years, I've met hundreds of residents and heard countless intriguing stories. With my background in print media, I was naturally drawn to the illustrious career of legendary sports writer and Hanover Township resident Jack McCallum.

Starting his career with stops at the *Bethlehem Globe-Times*, *The Morning Call*, along with newspapers in Baltimore and Philadelphia, McCallum found his home in 1981: *Sports Illustrated*.

McCallum covered a wide variety of sports but became best known for his coverage of the NBA. In 2005, he was named to the writers wing of the Basketball Hall of Fame in Springfield, Mass. In 2019, he was elected to the Basketball Writers of America Hall of Fame. He is also the author of 13 books, including *Dream Team*, which spent six weeks on *The New York Times* best seller list. In fact, McCallum was instrumental in creating the term "Dream Team" for the 1992 American men's Olympic basketball team. That particular team produced some of the best players (Michael Jordan, Larry Bird, and Magic Johnson) to ever play the game. To this day, McCallum still keeps in touch with some of the players from the "golden era" of basketball.

McCallum's magnificent career did not go without some trying times. He fought through prostate cancer, which resulted in another novel *The Prostate Monologues: What Every Man Can Learn from My Humbling, Confusing, and Sometimes Comical Battle with Prostate Cancer.*

When I approached McCallum to conduct a Q&A for Township residents, I was unsure if he'd go for it. He leads a busy life, which includes traveling, book tours, and spending time with his wife, two sons, and five grandchildren.

What I quickly found out was McCallum takes a great deal of pride in the community, one he happily makes time for. He quickly accepted my invite. Mark it on the calendar: October 30 at 6:30 p.m. in the Hanover Township Community Center Meeting Room.

"My wife (Donna) and I moved to Hanover Township in 1984 and have been in the same house since," McCallum said. "Our two sons went to Asa Packer, Nitschmann, and Liberty. My wife taught in the Bethlehem Area School District, so it

was convenient for her. Even though my job was New York-based, I mostly traveled for work and used A-B-E Airport all the time."

Nowadays, you might catch McCallum smashing overheads – with a heavy eastern grip – in pickleball inside the HTCC gymnasium.

"I tore my Achilles playing basketball in the (Community Center) gym many years ago and have enjoyed picking up a new set of friends while getting pummeled in pickleball. We love it here." he said.

State Senator Nick Miller (14th Senatorial District)

Since my last update, I shared about my new role in leadership as Chair of the Pennsylvania Senate Democratic Policy Committee. Since taking on this position, I have conducted nine policy hearings covering a variety of topics, in-

cluding energy affordability challenges, recruitment of emergency services and first responders, worker protections, and more. As Chair, I host these important hearings to engage with stakeholders and experts on these issues and discuss how we can bring their insights to Harrisburg.

In May, together with Representative Steve Samuelson, my office secured \$92,581 for new radios for the Hanover Township Volunteer Fire Company. This investment will ensure our emergency personnel are equipped to act swiftly and effectively to save lives, and it's important that we continue to support them.

This summer, I introduced two legislative bills addressing pressing needs in our community. Senate Bill 980, co-sponsored by State Senator Gene Yaw (R-23), aims to ban firefighting foam containing harmful PFAS starting in 2026.

This legislation protects the health of our frontline heroes and prevents environmental contamination.

I introduced Senate Bill 983 with State Senator Rosemary Brown (R-40) to create a rooftop solar program for industrial warehouses in Pennsylvania. This legislation aims to reduce consumer costs by efficiently integrating electricity into the grid, enhancing the energy system's resilience, while conserving green space.

My office is organizing several upcoming events. On October 31, 2025, I will co-host a free Disability Resource Fair with State Representative Jeanne McNeill at Suburban North YMCA in Catasauqua, PA, from 9am to 12 Noon. The event will feature a variety of vendors and organizations that provide information on programs and services tailored for individuals with mental and physical disabilities.

New Handheld Device Ban While Driving

A new Pennsylvania law banning the use of handheld devices while driving is now in effect. Paul Miller's Law, which started being enforced on June 5, limits the use of handheld cellphones or other communication devices while operating a motor vehicle. The law is named for a young man who was killed in a crash involving a distracted tractor-trailer driver in Monroe County, Pennsylvania, in 2010.

Under the law, driving while holding a mobile device is a primary violation, meaning police can pull over drivers solely for the violation. For the first 12 months, the penalty is a written warning. Effective in

June 2026, the penalty is a summary offense, which carries a \$50 fine, plus court costs and other fees. If a driver is convicted of homicide by vehicle and driving while distracted, they may be sentenced up to an additional five years in prison.

Drivers can still use their phones if using hands-free technology, such as a docking station, Bluetooth or speaker technology. You may also use your phone to contact emergency responders.

According to PennDOT, more than 11,000 crashes were the result of distracted driving, leading to 65 deaths and 6,700 injuries in 2023. Pennsylvania joins 28 other states with hands-free laws.

My Office Has Assisted 1,000 Individuals with Property Tax / Rent Rebate Applications

l am proud of my legislation, signed into law by Governor Shapiro two years ago, which expanded eligibility for the Property Tax/

Rent Rebate program to 175,000 additional people across Pennsylvania. And I am super proud of my extraordinary staff who have completed 1,000 Rebate applications so far this year! All year long, my office helps individuals apply for the Property Tax / Rent Rebate – at my office in Bethlehem, at my Hanover Township office hours, and at other outreach locations throughout our community.

The net income limit for the Property Tax / Rent Rebate this year is \$46,520 for homeowners and renters. I say "net income" because you need only count half of your Social Security income along with 100 percent of your other income when calculating eligibility for a rebate. The law which expanded eligibility also included a Cost-of-Living Adjustment, so that recipients will not lose out on a tax or rent rebate in future years when they receive increases in their Social Security. The program is open to people over the age of 65, widows and widowers over the age of 50 and people with disabilities (SSD and SSI recipients) over the age of 18. The deadline to apply for a 2024 rebate is December 31, 2025. Call my office at 610-867-3890 for more information.

Secretary of Agriculture Visits Hanover

This summer it was an honor to welcome Russell Redding, Pennsylvania Secretary of Agriculture, to Hanover Township to tour Monocacy Farm Project on Bridle Path Road. The farm is a wonderful example of using energy-efficient and sustainable practices in each aspect of its operations. In the Legislature, I am supporting increases to the budgets for the State Food Purchase Program and the Pennsylvania Agriculture Surplus System by \$4 million each as Pennsylvania works to offset federal cuts to the Local Food Purchase Assistance Program.

One of the greatest tests of my time in office came during the COVID-19 pandemic. Overnight, the way we lived, worked, and cared for one another changed. My focus was on keeping our residents safe while ensuring that County government continued to provide the services people depend on. Together with our public health partners, we worked to deliver vaccines, protect vulnerable residents, and keep essential operations running. It was not easy, but Northampton County came through that storm stronger and more united.

Even in those uncertain years, we held true to a simple promise: to be responsible stewards of taxpayer dollars. I am proud that we were able to cut taxes without cutting back on the programs and services that families rely on every day.

Another cornerstone of my administration has been preserving the land and heritage that make Northampton County unique while carefully balancing the pressures of eco-

nomic development. To date, we have protected more than 20,000 acres of farmland, ensuring that as our economy grows, future generations will still see rolling fields and working farms alongside thriving communities. This effort has been about more than acres and easements; it has been about protecting our identity and way of life while guiding responsible growth.

But leadership also means confronting new and urgent together to make this a stronger, healthier, and more resilient threats. The fentanyl crisis has touched every corner of our community, and in response, we launched the "Fake is Real" campaign to raise awareness about the dangers of counterfeit drugs. This initiative has already saved lives and will continue to be a critical tool in our fight against addiction.

> Finally, one of the accomplishments I am most proud of is keeping Gracedale Nursing Home county-owned and operated. There were many who said it could not be done, but I believed and still believe that Gracedale belongs to the people of Northampton County. Keeping it public means keeping it a place of dignity and compassion for our seniors and their families.

> These past eight years have been defined by challenges, but also by remarkable progress. Together, we have proven that Northampton County can protect its people, preserve its land, and plan responsibly for the future. Serving as your County Executive has been the privilege of my life, and I am deeply grateful for the trust you have placed in me.
